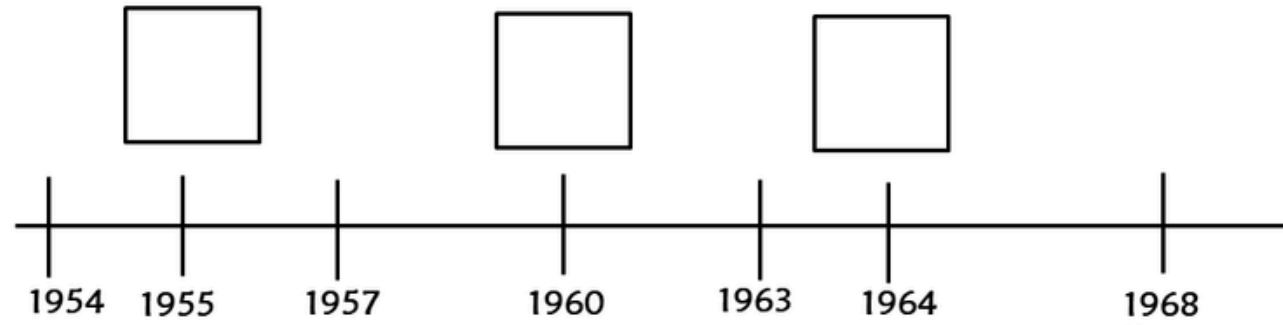
Every unit in the bundle comes with a vocabulary board. These are vital for increasing engagement and participation. Suggestions on how to utilize them are included in each unit.

The history units come with a book with engaging photos and simple text. There is a voice-recorded PowerPoint presentation as well as a movie version that you can play on Google Classroom.

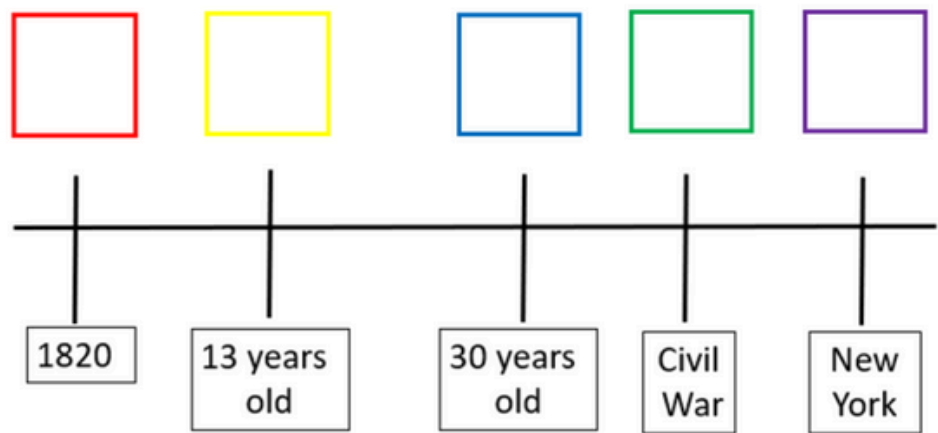
Timeline

Harriet Tubman Timeline



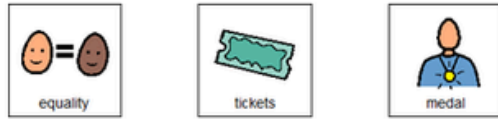
