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There is a 26 page social story that has simple text and photos. This story is in a PowerPoint and Google Slide format so you **can edit** the text if needed to fit your own situation.

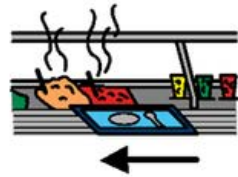
On most days, I will eat lunch while at school.

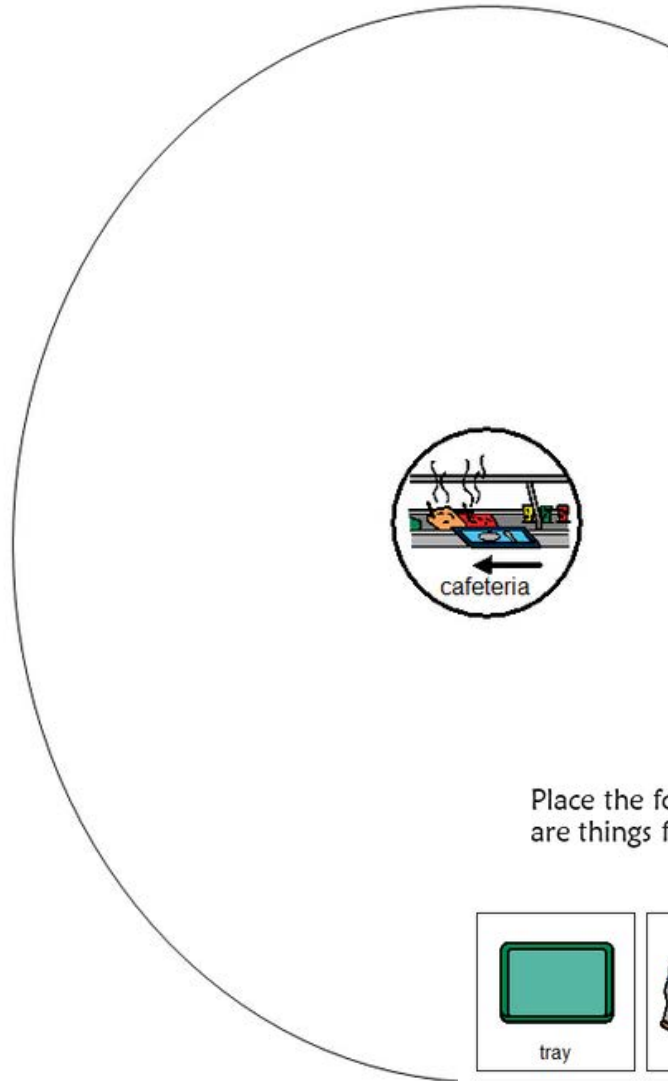



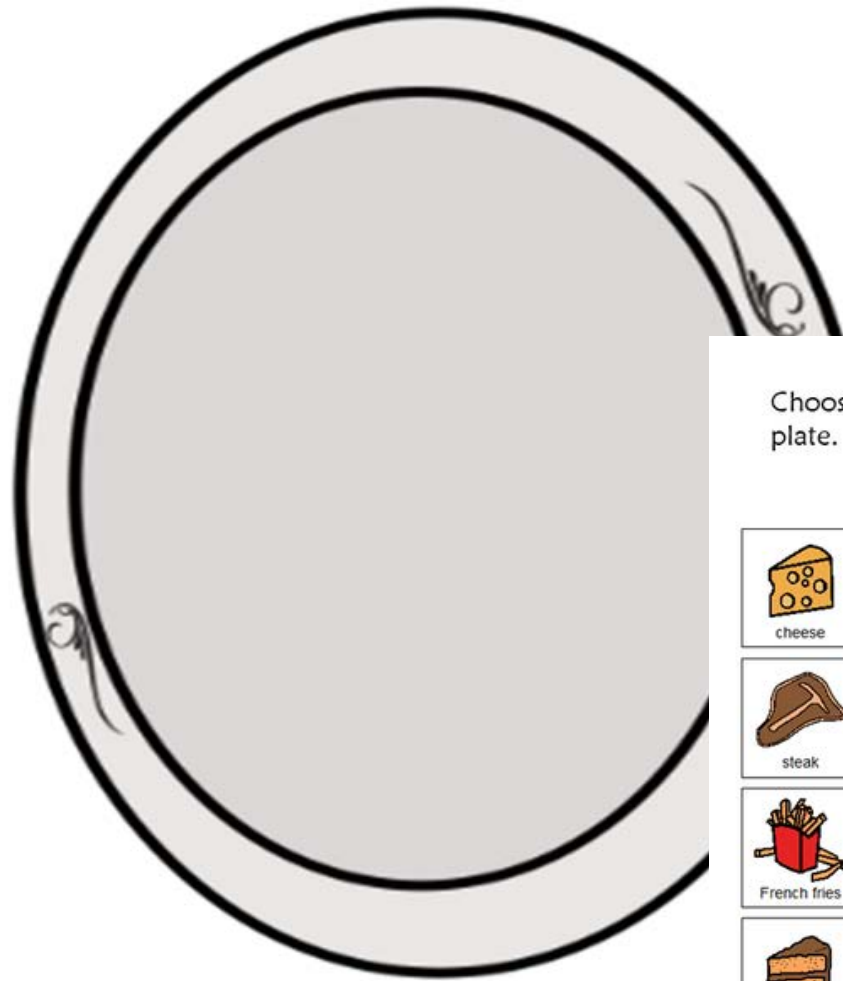
Place the following on the previous page **ONLY IF** they are things found in a cafeteria.

Students can assemble and personalize a power card to keep with them as a reminder of things they should do during lunchtime.

It comes in 2 formats and 2 sizes.

The activities that accompany this social story provide:

1. A structured way for you to review this skill.

2. A way to informally assess if students are comprehending the material.

3. Engages the student by providing different ways to review the same material.
