Making Predictions

Lesson Plan

Preparation

- Book
 - Print out, laminate, and bind
 - OR your students can listen to the pre-recorded version
- Vocabulary board
 - Print out the board onto cardstock and laminate
 - Make a card for each student
- You will have some short, simple stories or books that students are **unfamiliar** with to use in the group activities
- Various magazines are used in the group activities

Preassessment (do day 1 before starting lesson)

- Choose the quiz that best fits the learning level of your students (pictures or words)
- Give the quiz to assess
- I cannot emphasize enough, this preassessment

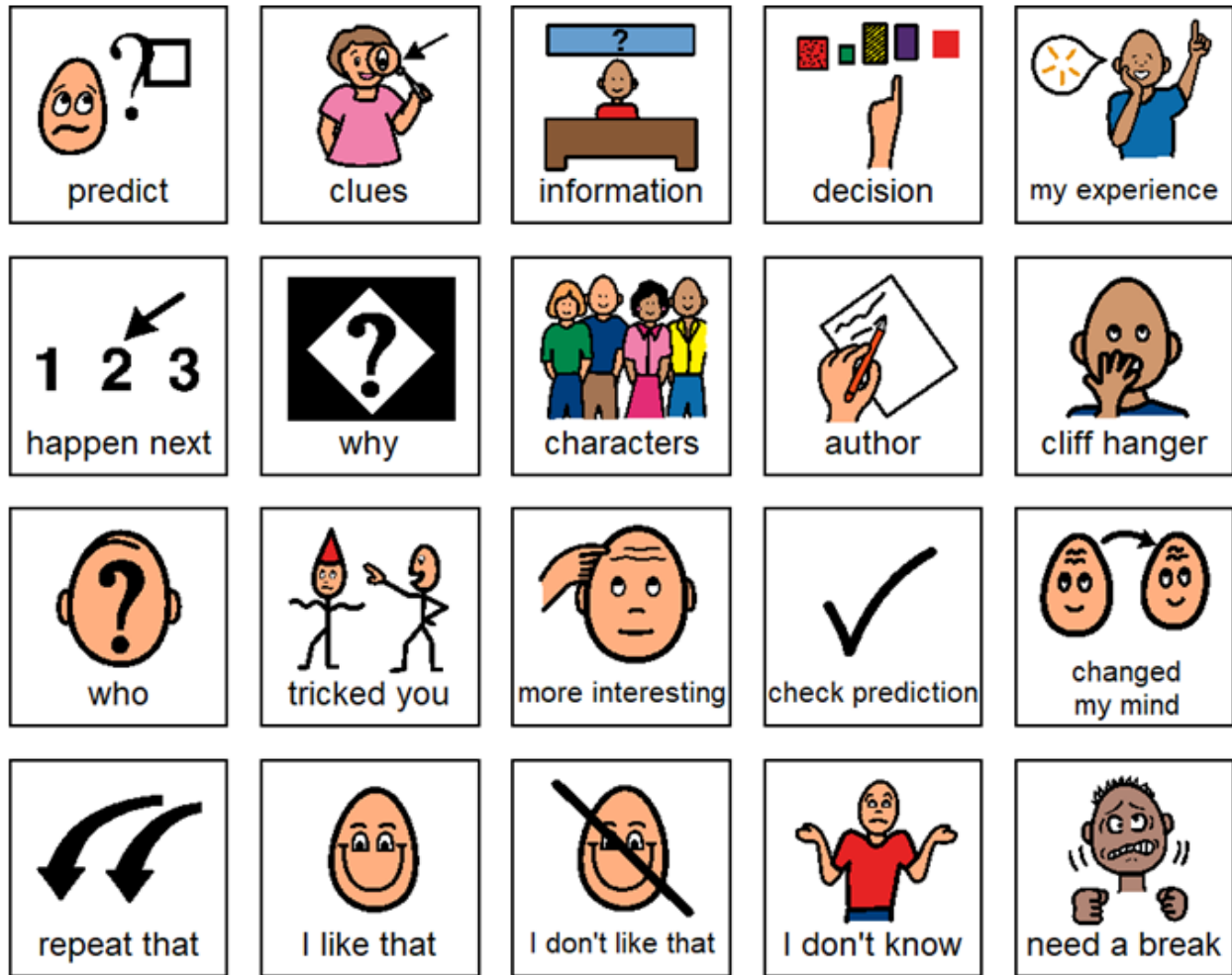

Tips on how to use included in the unit!!

Making predictions makes us better readers. By looking for clues and trying to figure out what comes next, we can understand more complex (and often more exciting) books.



Of course, making the prediction is only half of the puzzle. The other half is figuring out if you were right.



There is a book with this unit using simple text and photos. It is 21 pages and reviews how to make predictions in text.

GROUP ACTIVITIES FOR MAKING PREDICTIONS

Picture books (read alouds)

Here is what you will need:

- Picture books that are **unfamiliar** to the students

How to play:

- Use some books that are short and **unfamiliar** to the student.
- First look at the cover and title. Can they guess what the book may be about?
 - You can even cover up part of the cover and only show a little bit at a time.
- Each time you reveal more information have them recheck decide if they want to change it or not.

Predicting with objects

Here is what you will need:

- Group of 3-5 objects you would need to complete a task
- Large paper bag

How to play:

- Show students one object at a time and see if they can guess what you are doing with the items in your bag
- Each time you reveal a new object have them recheck their prediction if they want to change it or not.
- *Try to show the most obvious item last.*

Examples

- Making spaghetti: pot, strainer, jar of sauce (take label off)
- Wrap a present: box, tape, scissors, wrapping paper
- Play a board game: individual pieces to game, dice/spinner
- Paint a picture: paper, smock, cup for water, brushes, palette
- Get ready for bed: toothbrush, floss, wash cloth, book, pajamas

Predicting from a photo

Here is what you will need:

- Pictures from magazines

How to play:

- Give students a picture and have them predict what they think is going to happen
- Make sure students identify the clues in the picture that led to their prediction.

Predicting from a cover

Here is what you will need:

- Various magazines
- National Geographic works really well

How to play:

- Only looking at the cover of the magazine, can student predict what will be inside?
- If using a magazine like National Geographic that has lots of different stories, be sure to place a sticky note indicating where students should go in the magazine to check their prediction.

Predicting from a series of pictures

Here is what you will need:

- There is a PowerPoint included in this unit that has 10 sequences of 5 pictures where students guess what is going to happen.

How to play:

- Show one picture at a time.
- Have students predict an answer to the question posed at the beginning of the set of pictures.
- Be sure they tell you the evidence they are using to make that prediction.
- Then show the next picture and see if students want to keep or change their prediction. Why? Evidence?
- Continue through the 5 pictures.

Predicting what is hiding under the puzzle pieces

Here is what you will need:

- There is a PowerPoint included in this unit that has 20 hidden pictures.
- 10 are easy with only 9 puzzle pieces hiding the image.
- 10 are hard with 25 puzzle pieces hiding the image

How to play:

- Have students tell you which puzzle piece to remove.
- Click on that piece and delete the puzzle piece revealing some of the hidden picture.
- Have students guess what is under the rest of the puzzle pieces.
- Continue removing pieces, have students check their prediction each time to decide if they want to change it or not.

There are group activities that you can incorporate as part of the daily lesson.

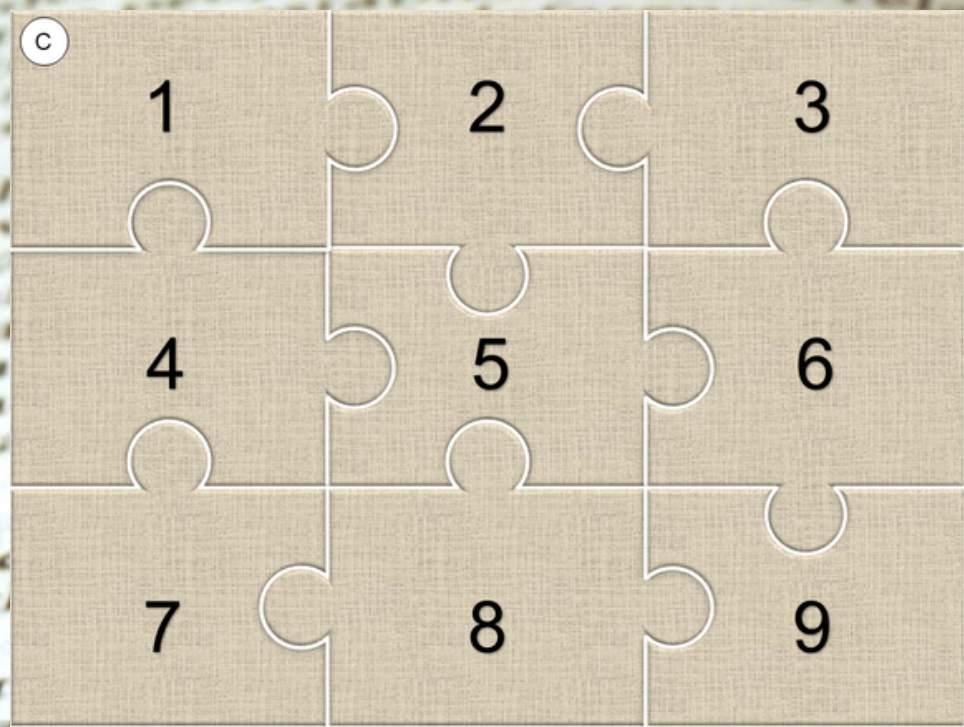


10 sequences

There are 10 sequences of 5 pictures to use as a group activity. Students will look at one picture at a time and make a prediction of what will happen.

With each new picture, they will check their prediction and decide if they want to change it or keep it.

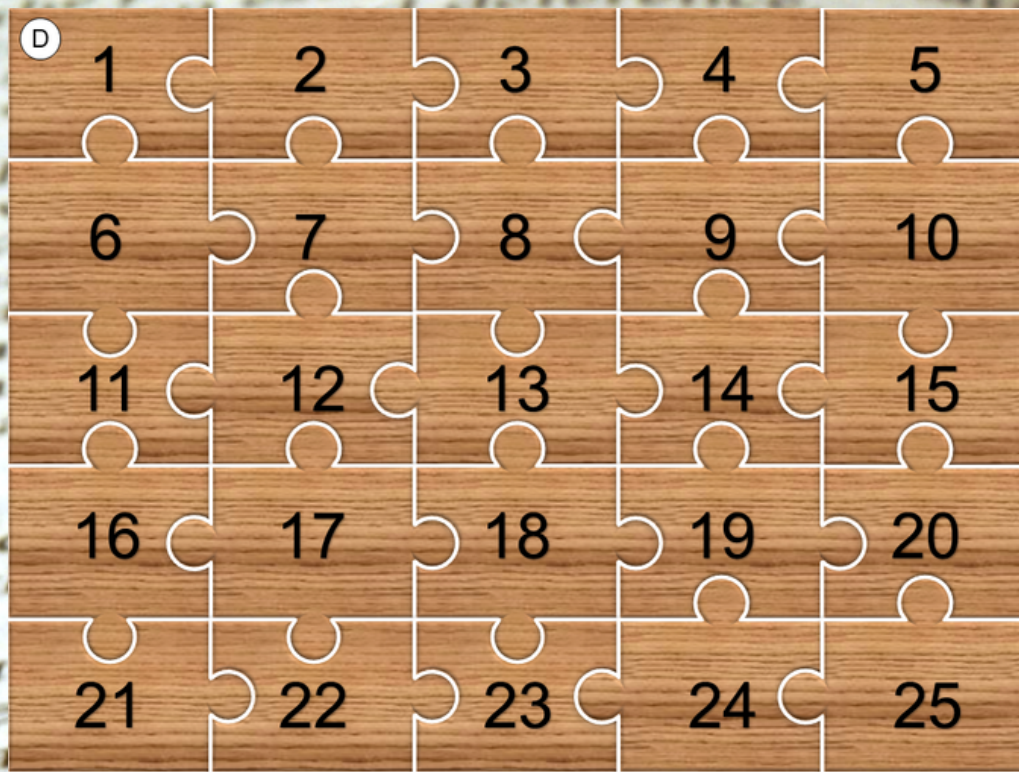


Easy puzzles

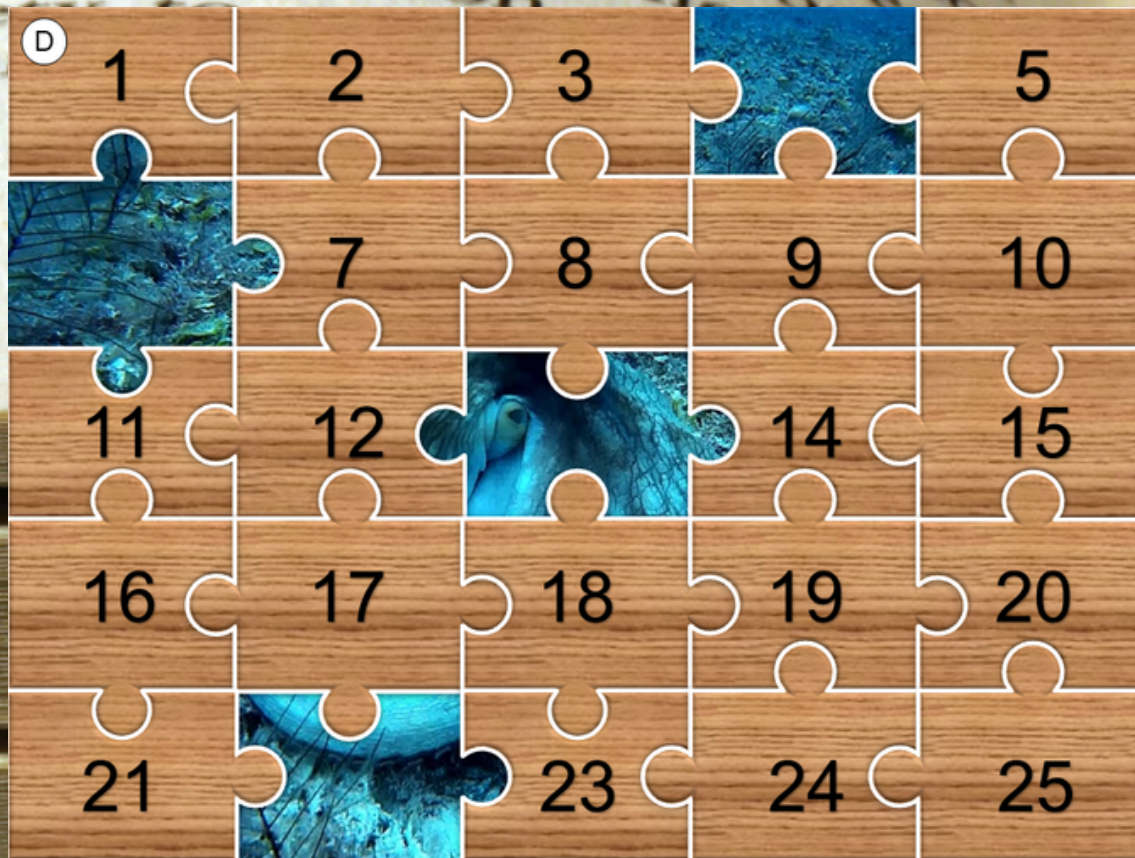
Another group activity is predicting what a picture is covered with puzzle pieces. There are 2 sets. This is the easy version that has only 9 pieces. Piece-by-piece puzzles are deleted. With each new piece gone, students check their prediction and decide if they want to change it. Continue until the entire image is revealed. How many pieces before your guess was correct?

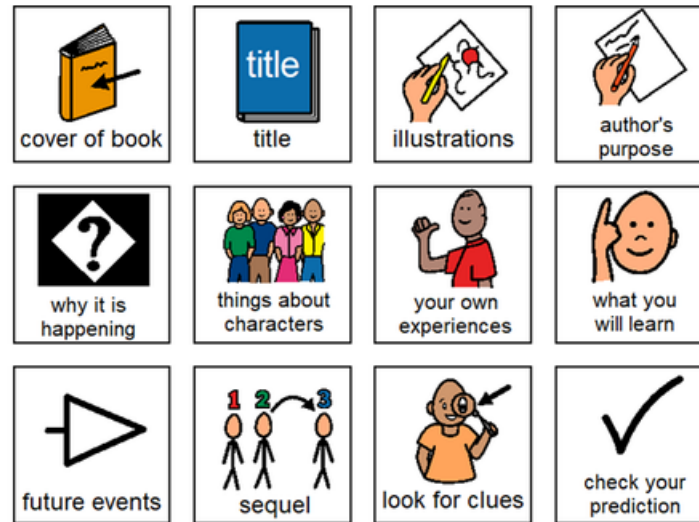
The other set of puzzles is more challenging. They have 25 pieces and are played the same way. Teachers should prompt students to label or point to clues they are using to make their predictions.

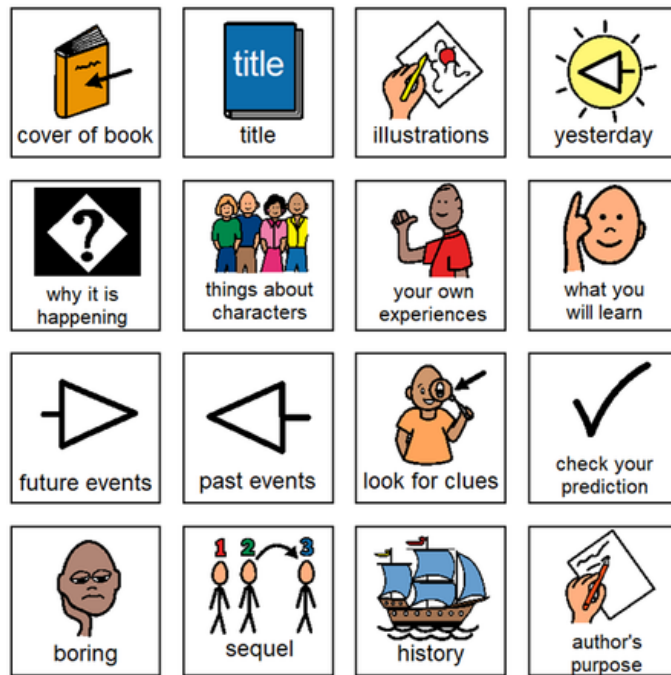

- One has wrong answers mixed in students will have to set aside

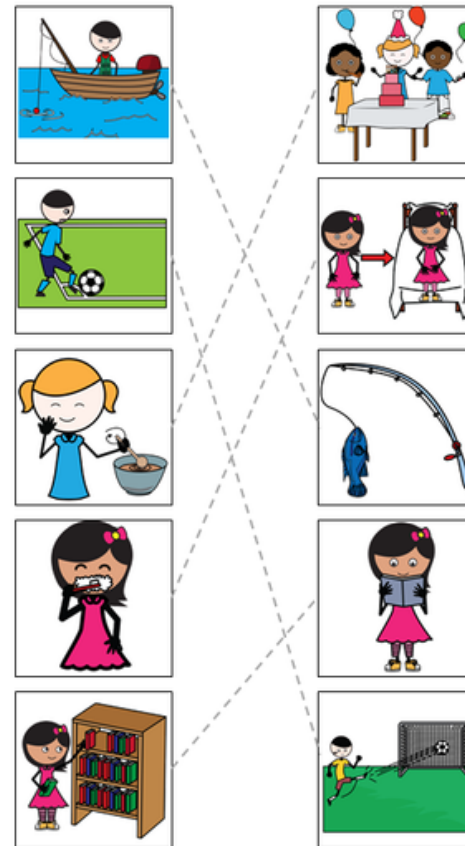

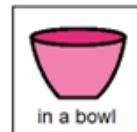
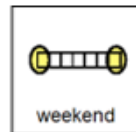
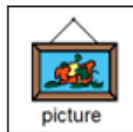


My grandmother is known for making some of the best soup in town. She makes soup every weekend. I love her soup except when she makes it too spicy! And she makes it spicy a lot of the time.

Training for a marathon

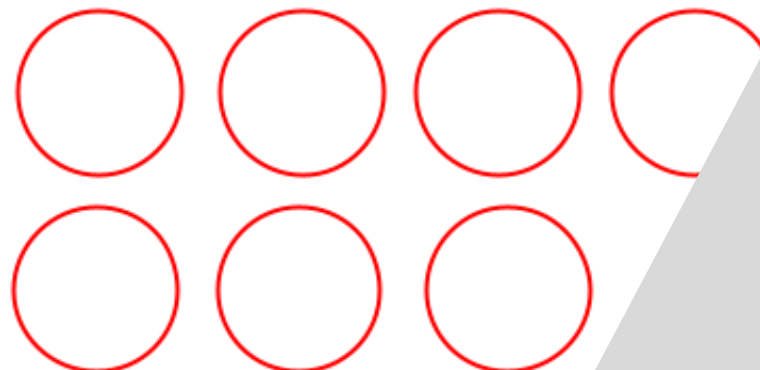
