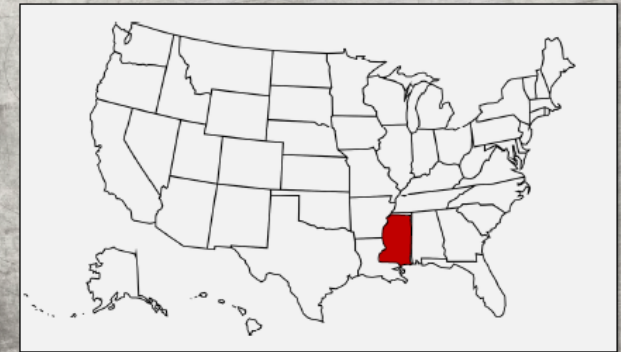
The flapper became a symbol of this new found excitement that women had. Women who were flappers had short hair, short skirts, drank alcohol and smoked.

 To move things from one location to another.


Temperance Movement
